Only the one in the bell




Bells.

How far can you go, starting from these elements, without losing the elementary sound and its recognition?

Regularly laying the sounds of the bells next to human presence?

Simply putting down the tower from time to time?



St.Rombout's cathedral of Mechelen (Belgium).

Mechelen is a carillon city. It harbours no less than five carillons. The Royal School for Carillon enjoys wide international acclaim.

The St.Rumbold's tower actually has two carillons: an old one that is no longer in use and a new one that was built in the 1980s by the firm Eijsbouts.



We were not looking for a carillon player or for carillon music. We were looking for a musician/sound artist, to interpret what was given in a completely different way, using the bells as material, as a sound source. For two days we climbed the tower, with its 514 steps and made recordings in every space.

The whole tower turned into sound. The other ambient recordings were made in the streets of and the domain Rozendael in Sint-Katelijne-Waver (near Mechelen)
